1st Sunday of Advent THE PROMISE OF HOPE

Be Watchful! Be Alert!

"Watch, therefore; you do not know when the lord of the house is coming, whether in the evening, or at midnight, or at cockcrow, or in the morning." Mark 13:35

INSPIRATION FOR THE FIRST SUNDAY OF ADVENT

The core message of Advent cannot be more direct or simple: *Be Watchful. Be Alert.* As those who are postured in a spirit of readiness and anticipation, we must always be attentive and vigilant. We have to be ready not only for the anticipated arrival of our Lord, but watchful and attentive to the unexpected visit as well.

While we know that the Christ is coming, we also do not know the exact time. Cultivating this expectant attitude is the purpose of this season. It is easy to grow slack, inattentive, and too self-assured. We can easily deaden ourselves to the wonder and surprise of God's presence. We get so absorbed in so many other distractions that it can seem like Christ's second coming, and even Christ's coming in time, is of lesser importance.

REFLECT AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

Jesus instructs his disciples to be vigilant for the end times. How can you make this spiritual discipline a focus of your Advent season this year?

SYMBOLS AND CUSTOMS OF ADVENT

- 1. The Advent Wreath is traditionally made of evergreen branches formed into a circle with 4 candles. The evergreen circle is a symbol of eternal life. Green from the evergreen is considered a symbol of hope.
- 2. The Advent candles are comprised of three purple candles and one pink candle. The candles recall the weeks that pass until Christmas. The purple candles symbolize waiting. The pink candle is used on the third Sunday, which is Gaudete Sunday, meaning Rejoice. Sometimes, there is a white candle in the middle representing Christ entering the world.
- 3. The Jesse Tree is named for Jesse, the father of King David, whose line can be traced to St. Joseph, the earthly father of Jesus. The Jesse Tree is used to explain the Old Testament generational connection between Adam, Abraham and Jesus as explained in the Gospels of Matthew and Luke.
- 4. The Advent calendar shows the passing of the days of the season. It can be used as a visual tool of preparation and patiently waiting for Christ to come into our lives.
- 5. The Nativity scene or Creche is used to commemorate the humble birth of Christ.



2nd Sunday of Advent PREPARATION AND PEACE

Prepare for the Way of the Lord! *"Prepare for the way of the Lord. John the Baptist appeared in the desert proclaiming a baptism of repentance and forgiveness of sins."* Mark 1:3-4

INSPIRATION FOR THE SECOND SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Prepare the way of the Lord! The message of John the Baptist becomes the calling of every baptized disciple of Jesus Christ. Each one of us is asked to prepare the way of the Lord. Given the humble means of our lives, how can we do this? It certainly does not require that we stand on street corners announcing God's future coming! We can more readily take up the task of our lifework by clearing our lives of unnecessary, distracting clutter. By conducting ourselves in holiness and devotion, we can speak volumes to those we meet. Not by preaching actual words, but by living lives that communicate the comfort God wants His people to know.

REFLECT AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

Mark opens his Gospel by presenting the words and activities of John the Baptist in the context of fulfilling Isaiah's prophecy heard in our first reading. Why do you think connecting Isaiah to John the Baptist was important to Mark and his community?

As a reminder, Christmas Day falls on a Monday this year. The Fourth Sunday of Advent is the day before, which is Sunday, December 24.

We, as Catholics, are obligated to attend Mass for both of these holy days.

3rd Sunday of Advent JOY & LIGHT: GAUDETE SUNDAY

God is the Joy of my Soul! "A man named John was sent from God. He came for testimony, to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him." John 1:6-7

INSPIRATION FOR THE THIRD SUNDAY OF ADVENT

What gives you joy? Joy is stumbled upon when we see a newly born child for the first time, get caught up in the vastness of a mountain landscape, or are led out into infinity gazing at an ocean's horizon. Joy is a profound experience that in its uniqueness grounds us in ultimate truth. God is the joy of my soul. Ponder those intense words! You will know moments of true and real joy by paying attention to your response to the experience. You will find yourself rejoicing and saying thank you.

REFLECT AND RESPOND TO SCRIPTURE

John tells us that the religious leaders in Jerusalem questioned the identity of John the Baptist, wondering if he was the Messiah, Elijah, or the Prophet who Moses prophesied would come. John the Baptist responds in humility, with a clear sense of his own call. Do you humbly accept God's call in your life?

INSPIRATION FOR THE FOURTH SUNDAY OF ADVENT

Does the world realize that it is waiting? As we go about all of the busyness of our lives and entertain our distractions, there are many holes and gaps in our lives that need to be filled. We are always wanting more, but not really sure what that "more" needs to be.

Fulfillment, happiness, contentment, and true satisfactions are fleeting occurrences and often come to us in illusive ways. What we think is the ultimate fix to our anxious emptiness really is only a fancy trend that we entertain. The world does not realize any more today than it did over two thousand years ago that it is waiting for a Savior.

We need a Savior. We need to see and embrace the God who has broken into history and become one with us. 
Let us be grateful beyond measure for this gift above all gifts, let us continue on our journey, and let our lives give testimony to the one who leads us.
